TO THE EDITOR

I recently read about a local school forced to stop their Bible classes. This prompted me to recall some of America's forgotten history, and see that we drifted away from our original foundings.

The first act of America's first Congress in 1774 was to ask a minister to open with prayer and to lead Congress in the reading of 4 chapters of the Bible.

In 1777, Congress, facing a National shortage of `Bibles for our schools, and families, and churches,' announced that they `desired to have a Bible printed under their care & by their encouragement' ordered 20,000 copies of the Bible.

The first English-language

Bible printed in America was in 1782, printed by the Continental Congress for the use of our schools."

In 1789, Congress passed the first federal law addressing education, requiring that schools teach "religion, morality, and knowledge."

In 1791, signer of the Declaration Benjamin Rush proposed the idea of public schools. He is actually called the Father of Public Schools in America. He penned a policy paper setting forth a dozen reasons why the Bible would never be taken out of schools.

In 1844, a unanimous U. S. Supreme Court declared: "Why may not the Bible, and especially the New Testament . . . be read and taught as a Divine revelation in [school]. . . . Where can the purest principles of morality be learned so clearly or so perfectly as from the New Testament?"

Throughout much of our history, teachers read the Bible to

students and scripture was memorized. Students and teachers prayed together and the Ten Commandments were displayed in the schools.

The Founding Fathers of our government did not believe that reading the Bible in schools was unconstitutional; rather, they believed the opposite; only in recent decades have judicial activism ruled otherwise. Ken Blinco

Thanksgiving Turkey with Stuffing and Gravy

STUFFING INGREDIENTS

- 1 (16 pound) turkey 6 cups water
- 3/4 cup egg substitute 2 pounds day-old white bread, cubed and toasted
- 2 medium onions, chopped
- 2 celery ribs, chopped
- 1 tablespoon poultry seasoning
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon rubbed sage
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper 6 tablespoons butter, melted
- 1 1/2 teaspoons paprika
- GRAVY
- 2 teaspoons chicken bouillon granules
- 2 cups boiling water 5 tablespoons all-purpose flour

DIRECTIONS

1. Remove giblets from turkey. In a saucepan, bring water, giblets and neck to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for 1 hour or until tender. Remove giblets with a slotted spoon; dice. Set aside 3 cups cooking liquid. In a bowl, combine egg substitute, bread crumbs, onions, celery, giblets, poultry seasoning, salt, sage and pepper. Add reserved cooking liquid; mix well. Just before baking, loosely stuff turkey with about 8 cups stuffing. Place remaining stuffing in a greased 2-qt. baking dish; refrigerate. Skewer turkey openings; tie drumsticks together. Place on a rack in a roasting pan. Brush with butter; sprinkle with paprika. 2. Bake uncovered, at 325 degrees F for 4-1/2 to 5-1/2 hours or until a meat thermometer reads 180 degrees F for turkey and 165 degrees F for stuffing, basting every 30 minutes (cover loosely with foil if turkey browns too quickly). Bake additional stuffing for 35-40 minutes. GRAVY

3. For gravy, dissolve bouillon in water. In a saucepan, whisk flour and 1/4 cup pan drippings until smooth. Gradually add bouillon mixture. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes. Serve with turkey and stuffing.



She was someone special and I remember when we, my sister and I. were kids Mom & Dad would go to some card party at one of their friend's home and they would drop us off at her home in town and we would spend the evening with her. Mostly the night would be a Saturday evening & as our folks were to

be at their party at eight we would arrive at 7 or better still we would like to be there in the afternoon so that we could help Grandma bake cookies, cakes & such. Sometimes Mom would take us there in the morning so that we could tag along with Grandma to the store to buy the fixings for all the good things that we would be eating that night

morning. In the spring, we

would help Grandma with the flower planting and the cleaning of the porch with the mops & pails of soapy water to scrub the wood floor to a shiny clean. It seemed that nothing was work when we spent the day or night with her. Grandma's home was a majestic place for a boy of 8 or ten, and the old barn out back where she kept the coal & wood for the cook stove was the object of some of the best times of our youth.

Grandma's home had 5 rooms on the first floor; a front room, a sitting room, kitchen, bath and one bedroom. Upstairs there were two bedrooms with large feather beds & quilts & blankets galore. The porch wrapped around the front of the home from the front room to the bedroom and had rocking chairs & a swing that was so much of a comfort to Grandma and us.

As we walked into the front room, from the porch, the first thing that was seen was the table with her radio and the old table lamp that was the only source of light in the room. The table was set below a window that looked out to a shade

tree and bushes where Grandma would feed the many birds that congregated around the lush leaves and she would always feed them with soot and other leftovers from her meals. A straight chair, a rocking chair & an old settee was the remaining furniture in the room and this room was the warmest of her home for in the corner stood the big black coal & wood stove that gave it's warmth so willingly, and the glow of past times for so many loving evenings.

Around this table & stove, Grandma would tell us stories about her youth and our favorite one was about old Shep, the collie, that was lost (but that's another story) and was found almost at death but was nursed back to health by his master.

The sitting room was just off this room with a bed, chairs and a cabinet that was so big it stood along one whole wall. The kitchen was to the right with two stoves; one small one that was used just for baking and the other one for cooking everything else. This stove was a wood stove and must have been 5 feet long with water storage tanks on each side to keep the food warm. Wood would be put on the grates in front & the old iron stove would cook & bake the many meals for her



family.

I can still see her standing over that cook stove with a pot here, a dish there, a skillet with steaming food being readied for a Sunday dinner. A large cupboard stood against one wall and a dry sink beside that and by the window that looked out back was the round oak table that served the meals that were so much a part of her. A bath was off the kitchen, with its bathtub standing on its legs, with a wash basin where we washed & cleaned ourselves after a day's work in her garden or playing in the barn or just hanging around.

The next room was Grandma's bedroom and next to that was the stairs that went to the bedrooms upstairs. Feather beds, old storage chests & chest of drawers, an old sofa there, a wicker chair there, a hope chest, some rugs, a lamp, quilts & comforters, a dresser by the wall, standing mute, and dresses & Grandpa's shirts & pants, neatly hung in the closet, with the love that she had for him, even encompassing the love she had for us .

From our farm she would have a fat old hen broiling on the stove and then would make her tasty homemade noodles, wrapped in soft cloth, to be ready to cut when they dried to her approval. The aroma was overwhelming to us, as we would sneak in & grab a hand full of those tantalizing morsels. At the other stove, she would have sugar cookies baking and maybe some ginger men cookies, with icing of different colors. After the evening meal, and our baths, we would sit around the big ole stove & eat cookies, drink her home made hot cocoa & listen to her bed time stories.

The winter time was especially fond, because we could snuggle down in the old feather bed, and if it was really cold, she would warm the flat iron on the stove, wrap it in soft towels for our feet at the foot of the bed. We were never really cold in Grandma's home, cause of the warmth of the quilts, blanket's, and mostly, the love that she gave to us.

Summer & fall was just as much fun at Grandma's for she was always out in the yard digging & planting flowers and keeping her yard neat & tidy. The huge maple tree in the front of the home provided hours of fun when the leaves would fall lazily to the ground and she would rake them into a big & soft pile for me & my sister to play, jump & frolic in. Only after we tired of playing in the leaves, & they were scattered all over her yard were we permitted to rake them to the side of the road & start a fire with her watching & burn them and then roast hotdogs & brown marshmallows in the dying embers.

Sunday mornings were all so special for after sleeping & dreaming the night away she would wake us with the wonderful smells of toast, homemade jams & jellies, rolls with honey dripping from them..... When mother would come by to pick us up for church we would be washed & in our Sunday best & Grandma would have her hair done up in a roll on top of her head ready to lead her family in thankful & faithful prayer. I can still see her late a night sitting by the table in the front room listening to the radio, brushing her hair that was so long that it came almost to her feet. She would let her hair down, and brush it a hundred times, with each stroke caressing each strand to a luxurious shine to be repeated over and over again. We loved her so much and I can still feel the warmth of her embrace and Grandma Kate will always be remembered.

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

Several of the residents had already evacuated the home in the 5800 block of Main St. by the time Howard County and Baltimore County rescue units arrived just before midnight Saturday, officials said. Officials said that five of the seven

residents had high levels of carbon monoxide in their systems and that all seven were taken to the University of Maryland Medical Center.

Officials praised the fact that the home had a working carbon monoxide detector.
